- The total number of First-year Composition Learning Community sections (combination of ENGL1101/1102/1103) was 7; the total number of students is highly difficult to calculate because these courses were under enrolled to start however, at least 45 students took seats in LC 2015 2016.
- The total number of First-year Composition Special Topics courses was 13; the total number of students was 259.
- The total number of Online courses was 2. The total number of students was 44.
- The total number of sections of Honors First-year Composition was 11; the total number of students was 160.
